

Marion County Programs

- Clinical services
 - Provides direct and community services including, immunizations, reproductive health, STI screening, testing & treatment
- Communicable Disease Control
 - Reportable disease control, tuberculosis case management, STD/HIV case management
- Environmental Health
 - Food, pool, lodging inspections, water system surveys, vector control, and animal bite follow up
- Emergency Preparedness
 - ▶ ESF 8 lead and Continuity of Operations for MCHHS, emerging diseases response
- Maternal Child Health Services
 - ► Early childhood nursing, WIC, and Oregon Mothers Care
- Prevention & Promotion
 - Environmental, systems, and policy changes, alcohol, gambling and tobacco prevention, mental health promotion and suicide prevention. Coordinates CHIP


Marion County Budget FY1819

Polk County Budget FY1819




Communicable Disease Control

- High Rates of disease in both counties chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, HIV
- ► Funding an opportunity to continue CJS work through Public Health Modernization grant
- Commissioner support of the process

Marion Polk CJS Arrangement

- As-Needed
 - Information Sharing: meetings with joint partners
 - Surge: TB Contact Investigation
 - ► Surge: Water contamination
- Service-Related
 - Purchase of staff time on occasion
- Shared Programs or Functions
 - Public Health Modernization
 - Community Health Assessment & Improvement Plan
- No support for Regionalization/Consolidation

Intergovernmental Agreement

- **2018-2020**
- Only leadership may request support
- Discussed liability, motor pool usage, other legal & risk-related issues

INTERGOVE RNMENTAL AGREEMENT HE-2448-18 Between MARION COUNTY and POLK COUNTY

1. PARTIES TO AGREEMENT

This Agreement is between Marion County, a political subdivision of the state of Oregon, hereafter called Marion, and Polk County Public Health, a political subdivision of the state of Oregon, hereafter called Polk, (Collectively referred to as "Counties") and is made pursuant to ORS 190.010 (Cooperative Agreements).

2. PURPOSE/STATEMENT OF WORK

The purpose of this Agreement is to establish the terms and conditions under which Marion and Polk Counties will provide staffing services to each other to assist in requested program responsibilities for the purpose of furthering cross-jurisdictional sharing of Public Health services between the Counties. These services are further described in Section 5.

3. TERM AND TERMINATION

- 3.1 This Agreement shall be effective for the period commencing upon all signatures and ending on June 30, 2020 unless terminated or extended as provided herein.
- 3.2 This Agreement may be extended by agreement of the parties. Any modifications in the terms of such amendment shall be in writing.
- 3.3 This agreement may be terminated by mutual consent of both parties at any time or by either party upon 30 days' notice in writing, and delivered by mail or in person. Any such termination of this agreement shall be without prejudice to any obligations or liabilities of either party already accrued prior to such termination.

Challenges

- Turnover
 - ▶ New public health leaders
 - ▶ New commissioners elected/appointed in 2019
 - Staffing pool competitive job market
- Understanding the culture and process of each organization
 - ► Marion has many layers so smaller grant opportunities may not be worth it
 - ▶ Polk more nimble and may apply for the smaller grants
- Aligning job descriptions
- Cross Training
- Pay scales are not comparable

Evaluating Success

- Small, Short-term success
 - Completed an incident-specific contract, then had an opportunity to evaluate and make changes
 - Aligned job classification and related training for one position
 - Sharing a health care task force to improve system in both counties
- Mid-term
 - ► A new program specific conversation each year
 - Develop a joint recruitment for a health officer
- Long-term
 - ▶ Alignment of all services offered in each health department
